#### It's Budget Season with a "Twist" this Year!

The annual budget consists of four components: the Board of Selectmen (BOS) Operating Budget, the Board of Education (BOE) Operating Budget, the Town Capital Budget, and Debt Service (i.e., the Allgrove/Seymour Elementary School project). This year, an additional component or "twist" has been introduced with the Governor's FY18 Budget Proposal. His proposal potentially reduces state aid to East Granby by \$1.2 million or 55% when factoring in proposed town contributions to the State Teachers Retirement Plan (\$770,000) and actual reductions in State Grants-in-Aid and Educational Cost Sharing (\$500,000). While the Governor's budget is a proposal and the State Legislature will ultimately pass a budget, we should assume that the Town will receive less state aid than in the current year.

Based on the Governor's budget, the Board of Finance (BOF) held a special meeting in late February to discuss scenarios and options. Prior to the Governor's announcement, at their February 7th meeting, the BOF gave their initial direction to the BOS and BOE regarding proposed expenditures for the upcoming fiscal year (FY18). Preliminary budgets were presented by the BOE and BOS to the BOF on March 14th. This year, more than any other year, please attend the following meetings where you will have the opportunity to learn more about the annual budget and provide feedback to the boards.

#### Important Meetings and Notes—

April 4th: The BOF will meet at the Senior/Community Center at 7:30 PM to provide final direction to the boards regarding the budget to be presented to the town at the April 18th Public Hearing.

April 15th: We anticipate that the Annual Budget Edition of Let's Talk Turkey will be in houses on this date so that residents can review detailed presentations of budget components and costs. Budget information will also be available on the town website, www.eastgranbyct.org, at that time.

April 18th: The Annual Town Budget Hearing will be held at 7:30 PM at the East Granby High School Auditorium. All three boards will present the proposed budget and answer any resident questions. After the Hearing, the BOF will consider feedback, deliberate, and vote to send a proposed budget to Town Meeting.

April 25th: The Annual Town Meeting will be held at 7:30 PM at the Senior/Community Center. After a brief presentation by the boards along with time for resident questions and comments, the BOS anticipates that the Town Meeting will be adjourned without a vote and then subsequently taken to ballot referendum.

**Please Note:** The BOS is expected to call for a machine ballot referendum for early May. Polling hours would then be set at the April 25th Town Meeting. Our traditional polling place is the Senior/Community Center. Feel free to contact the Selectman's Office at (860) 413-3301 with any questions.

Senior Tax Relief: Residents aged 65 years or older along with residents who are disabled may be eligible for Senior Tax Relief. If you income qualify, the amount of property taxes that you will pay for the upcoming fiscal year may be reduced. If you have any questions or would like to make a confidential appointment, please call Assessor Mary Ellen Brown at (860) 653-2852.

2016 Grand List: The October 1, 2016 Grand List for the Town of East Granby has been finalized as of February 1, 2017. For the upcoming fiscal year (FY18), the value of taxable property in East Granby decreased by 0.93% with a net total of \$581,515,512. The split of the Grand List is 78% residential, 11.50% personal property, and 10.5% motor vehicles. Overall, real estate values increased by 0.014%, personal property (business equipment) decreased by 11.7%, and motor vehicles increased 4.8%.

#### **East Granby Historical Society News**

#### Railroad Program

On Tuesday, April 18th at 7:30 PM at the Senior/Community Center, the East Granby Historical Society will present "Rails, Trails, and Ruins: The Iron Horse in The Granbys, 1850-2017." Robert Joseph Belletzkie will give a narrated video presentation on local railroad history. He will focus on the Central New England Railway's Springfield Branch, which gave East Granby its first direct rail service in 1901. The speaker will cover the famed Battle of Montague Farm, a villainous tale of legal obfuscation, corporate greed, and outright deceit, a saga unique in state railroad history and possibly beyond. He will also reveal the location of hidden ruins that still memorialize the conflict over a century later.



Belletzkie, an avid ferroequinologist, is a retired academic reference librarian and a member of the Connecticut Historical Society, the New Haven Railroad Historical and Technical Association, and other societies. He has been researching railroads for nearly 50 years and has given a number of talks on the many ways in which the iron horse impacted the state and its communities.

Following a brief 7:00 PM meeting, the 7:30 PM presentation will last about an hour; questions, discussion to follow. All are welcome to attend this free, public event. Refreshments will be served.

#### **East Granby Cemetery Association**

In 1987, Congress declared the month of March to be Women's History Month with the purpose of honoring women and remembering their contributions and sacrifices to our world.



Since this article appears in the March issue of *Let's Talk Turkey*, it seems appropriate to talk about women's history in the cemetery! The gravestones give us an insight into the roles of women in early America. Women in the cemetery usually bear one of these descriptive names on their stones to describe their station in life: daughter, sister, aunt, wife, mother, or widow. A wife is sometimes called the relict (widow) or consort of her husband. Her stone is

often smaller than his. The verses and even the names of women (Silence, Thankful, Comfort, Mercy, Charity, Modesty, Patience) suggest a supportive or submissive role. A woman's name is usually attached to her husband's name, or to her father's name if she was unmarried. A man's stone may mention the names of more than one wife. But a woman's stone does not record the names of her husbands if she was married more than once. A woman's maiden name was not usually recorded on her stone—only her married name at time of death was recorded on the stone. Here we have yet another cultural significance of gravestones in that they give us an insight into the social status and roles of women in early America. Perhaps when the weather is a little warmer, you might want to take a walk through the East Granby Center Cemetery and pay particular attention to the headstones of women!

On a personal note, The East Granby Cemetery Association Board regrets the passing of Edna Herzig, one of its long time members. This kind and gentle lady will be missed by all.

The East Granby Cemetery Association is a small group of volunteers who oversee the maintenance and preservation of the cemetery. We meet only about four times a year and we welcome new members. #### **News from the Tax Office**

The tax office is bound by the Connecticut General State Statutes (C.G.S.). Details can be found in Chapter 204, Section 12 Local Levy and Collections of Taxes.

We have completed the tax collections for January installments that included Supplemental Motor Vehicle taxes. Effective on January 3rd, our office began using the Webster Bank lockbox with the Supplemental Motor Vehicle taxes. The benefit of this process is that all payments sent via regular mail are sent to our bank. In

July, 2017 all mailed payments are to be sent to Tax Collector, Town of East Granby, P.O. Box 150411, Hartford, CT 06115-0411.

As stated in the past, when mailing your bill it is very important to include the payment coupon provided by our office to ensure your account is credited appropriately. If you require a receipt, include the entire bill and a self-addressed envelope. Webster will send this information to our office and we will stamp and mail back your receipt. When making payments for someone else with your bank check, make sure to indicate the person's name and what you are paying for. It is very important to verify the amount on the payment coupon to your check—we have noticed some checks are paying too much or too less. If you use official payments (e-checks, debit or credit cards) make sure you enter the list number. This is the last seven digits under the list number from the payment coupon. For example, for 2015 MS 0000236 you would enter tax year 2015 and list number 0000236.

We will still receive payments at our office Monday through Thursday from 8:00 AM to 12:00 PM and 1:00 to 4:00 PM and on Friday from 8:00 AM to 1:00 PM. Tax bills will be mailed the last week in June. The last day to pay taxes for the July 1st installment is August 1st. The last day to pay taxes for the January 1, 2018 installment is February 1, 2018. If you have not received your bill by the first week in July, contact our office or visit the website www.eastgranbyct.org. Click on the tab "I Want To..." and select "Look Up Property Tax." Failure to receive a bill does not excuse the obligation of tax due per Connecticut General Statute 12-130. Taxes not paid by the grace period will result in interest being charged at a rate of 1.5% to the original due date per C.G.S 12-145. For example, a tax bill due July 1st with 30 day grace is to be paid or postmarked by August 1st. Taxes paid after August 1st are charged 3% (1.5% per month to original due date of July 1st).

When coming into our office bring the entire payment coupon. We will use the necessary section for our records and stamp the taxpayer copy for July and again in January.

Forms of payment accepted in our office are bank check, cash, money order, or personal check. You have the ability to use debit and credit card at the counter. Please note the service fee to use a debit or credit card will remain, as this is a convenience fee charge by the vendor that processes the cards. The question has been asked why the charge if no fee is charged at the grocery store, gas stations, dining, and retail transactions? The answer is that those establishments are businesses that absorb the cost as a business expense. Municipal government runs on a budget and other taxpayers are not going to pay for another taxpayer who elects to use the card for paying taxes. If a taxpayer elects to use this convenience service the cost is absorbed by the taxpayer, not the Town of East Granby.

As a reminder, when a motor vehicle has been destroyed or sold, to avoid waiting in our office please bring the information to our Assessor's Office. They will assist you with this transaction. The Tax Office cannot adjust your bill.

#### **Planning and Zoning Registry**

In accordance with Public Act 06-80, the Planning and Zoning Commission will, effective October 1, 2006, establish a public notice registry of landowners, electors, and nonprofit organizations requesting notice of Commission initiatives regarding adoption or change of any zoning regulation or boundary or any subdivision regulation or regarding the preparation or amendment of the plan of conservation and development.

Requests to be placed on the registry must be in writing and are to include your (or organization) name, postal address, and electronic mail address and submitted to: Building Department, East Granby Town Hall, P.O. Box 1858, East Granby, CT 06026.

The name and address of a landowner, elector, or organization who requests to be placed on the public notice registry shall remain on the registry for a period of three years. Thereafter any land owner, elector, or organization may request to be placed on the registry for an additional period of three years.

Notice shall be sent by electronic mail to registrants not later than seven days prior to the commencement of the public hearing on such action, if feasible. Notice will be sent by postal mail only if the registrant has no electronic mail address and provides the Building Department with self-addressed stamped envelopes.

#### **Capitol Update**

Rep. Tami Zawistowski, 61st District

March is an extremely busy time at the Capitol. Last month, Governor Malloy released his proposed two-year budget. His proposal includes radically shifting taxpayer funds from our smaller municipalities to fund our large cities, requires towns to contribute to the state run teachers retirement program for the first time, sharply reduces education funding, and makes further cuts—all of which will result in a reduction of over \$1 million in state aid to East Granby for 2018—a cut of more than 50% from previous years.

I and many of my colleagues are appalled at the Governor's proposal. It pits small towns against big cities, especially for education aid, dramatically reducing aid for small towns and offering large increases to our big cities—where it has been proven time and again that their higher level of education funding does little on its own to improve education of their public school students. There are other very questionable ideas—for example, while taking \$407 million from municipalities statewide this year to cover a third of the annual cost of teacher pensions that have always been the state's responsibility, it also proposes things like bonding \$250 million to renovate and attract a pro hockey team to the XL Center in Hartford, a perpetually troubled venue in a city that does not exactly have a good track record of attracting and retaining professional sports teams.

In the Appropriations Committee on which I serve, we are nearing completion of public hearings and are currently in the process of budget review and analysis. Subcommittees meet in small groups with state agencies to comb through budgets line by line seeking efficiencies and other cost savings. Based on results of that process, the Appropriations Committee will then develop the spending portion of a new two-year state budget, which is likely to differ from the Governor's budget, for consideration by the legislature. The Finance and Bonding Committee, which deals with taxes and other sources of income to the state, will develop the revenue portion of that budget.

What the final budget will look like is subject to many pressures. For example, about 77% of state spending is for fixed costs, which includes pensions, debt service, Medicare/Medicaid, and state worker salaries and benefits which are set under collective bargaining contracts. That means that there is only about 23% of the budget that we can effectively modify. In that 23% are expenditures to ensure public safety plus other vital programs such as those protecting persons with intellectual disabilities. Put all that against the backdrop of about a \$3.0 billion state deficit over the next two year period, and it's easy to see that a lot of tough choices will need to be made, and that our municipalities will inevitably be negatively impacted in some ways. We are working on unfunded mandate relief, which should help, but it will not make up for the proposed reductions in state aid.

I do wish I could report better news about the state budget. I will be working very hard over the next months to mitigate losses in funding to East Granby and the rest of the 61st district. Budget season is upon us again. This year, the state's financial crisis will likely result in decreased funding to small municipalities like East Granby, especially under the Governor's proposed budget. You can expect cuts in state aid which will result in increased property taxes to make up for the shortfall. These funding cuts, along with a decrease in the Grand List and increases in our Board of Education and General Government spending, could result in significant property tax increases, possibly in the high single digits.

We need to find ways to lessen this tax burden. One way would be to encourage growth in our tax base by bringing in suitable new businesses. Another way would be to re-think our approach to how we educate our children, particularly at the high school level. While our student population has remained somewhat steady (partly due to the addition of Pre-K and Choice students), neighboring school districts report 10-15% drops in enrollment over the last five years. This trend is expected to continue for the next decade, with some figures up to a 25% decline. The current president of the Connecticut Association of Public School Superintendents has reported that Connecticut must find a way to consolidate our school resources, and it is imperative that we do not ignore this trend. Several neighboring towns have expressed interest in partnering with East Granby in educating our students. It is essential that we explore this option so that we can reduce our heavy administrative burden and provide expanded opportunities for our children in both a wider curriculum variety and in more extracurricular activities—both of which are considered by college admissions officers.

You can help by participating in our town's decision making process on this and other issues. Attend meetings such as the Board of Education, Board of Finance, and Board of Selectmen and use the public comment periods to express your views. Offer your ideas at meetings of the Economic Development Commission, or volunteer to join. Participate at town meetings. Vote. Run for local public office.

#### **Concerned Taxpayers of East Granby**

Concerned Taxpayers of East Granby (CTEG) is a non-partisan organization for East Granby taxpayers to promote a balance of town spending versus quality of services and affordability of living in town. CTEG promotes involvement of taxpayers in town government decision-making in order to ensure the economic viability of our community.

It's budget season again, and unfortunately the news this year for Connecticut taxpayers is beyond bad. After all the sweetheart deals that the Governor and the legislature made with state employees and other special interest groups, the chickens are coming home to roost-and a \$2 billion state budget deficit has to be closed. Accordingly, the Governor's budget slashes state aid to towns, which would result this year in a \$1.5 million hit to East Granby's bottom line. In addition, our Grand List of taxable property is decreasing by 1%. That's a net loss of over 7% of East Granby's town revenue. At the same time that revenue is being cut, the teachers' contract was approved with annual 3% salary increases for each of the next three years, and the school administrators contract will seek the same. The current year's town budget is already up to \$22 million, having increased by an average of almost 4% annually over the last decade. Bottom line for the coming year, East Granby taxpayers are potentially facing an 8-11% increase in property taxes—which remains in perpetuity—if spending isn't cut to match the revenue loss.

The next Board of Finance meeting will be on Tuesday, April 4th, at which time the Board will direct the Board of Selectmen and Board of Education what budget numbers to present to the town at the annual Public Hearing on the budget at the High School on April 18th. This meeting of the BOF will be held at the Senior/Community Center at 7:30 PM.

Other issues currently in the works in East Granby town government are changes to the town ordinances, and the revision of East Granby's 10-year Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). Updates are available from the office of the First Selectman, or the Planning and Zoning Commission, respectively, both in Town Hall (www.eastgranbyct.org, 860-653-2576, info@egtownhall.com).

Lastly, the featured highlight of the East Granby Public Schools Efficiency Report completed at the end of last year was that East Granby's expenditure per high school pupil is third highest out of the state's 160+ school districts, and over 40% higher than the rest of East Granby's District Reference Group. The huge excess capacity in the high school led to the recommendation that the Board of Education explore creating a regional high school with a neighboring school district. After a statewide survey by the Connecticut Economic Resource Center (CERC), the President of CERC said that "Increasingly, towns will not be able to afford to sustain the level of services to which they have become accustomed, as budget pressures increase along with a reluctance to raise taxes. Residents showed a willingness to consider regionalism as a solution."

The survey also found that the most important factor when choosing a town in which to live was property taxes, followed by the quality of the school system. If you want your voice to be heard on matters of the town budget, municipal governance, POCD, or other issues, go to Board meetings and public hearings and show Board and Commission members that you're watching and will hold them accountable. Vote in the referendums, municipal elections, and at town meetings—every vote counts, literally! In East Granby, referendums, elections, and town meeting votes are often decided by margins of as little as two to four votes! Do whatever you can to help keep our town government oriented responsibly. Come to a CTEG meeting to talk with likeminded neighbors and discuss your ideas.

All CTEG meetings are on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 PM at the East Granby Public Library. Our next meeting will be this Monday, March 20th, and the following meeting on Monday, April 17th. All CTEG meetings are open to the public. Come and find out what's going on in the community. Share your thoughts and concerns with people who are interested in keeping East Granby a great place to live, work, and retire. If you can't come to meetings, we're still interested in your ideas. #### Message to the East Granby Community about the East Granby Public Schools

It is hard to believe that we are already approaching the end of the third quarter of the 2016-2017 school year. We look forward with great anticipation to what the Spring season brings – foliated trees, beautiful flowers, longer days, an array of outdoor sports and activities, bike rides and baseball. Administrators, faculty and staff are working determinedly to ensure that every learner achieves and masters the content and skills established at the beginning of the year.

Again this school year, our students continue to perform at high levels demonstrating that they are focused and fully engaged in meaningful learning activities. We are particularly pleased with the ability of our students to meet challenges head on and step up to the increased rigor that we have presented to them on a daily basis in their classes.

Students in East Granby Middle school recently participated in the annual Invention Convention where students in grades 7 and 8 proudly demonstrated and explained their inventions to a large crowd in the middle school gymnasium. The goal of the Invention Convention program is to encourage students to develop critical-thinking and creative problem-solving skills. In addition, in late January 2017, teams of students from East Granby Middle School participated in the Kids' Lit Quiz literature competition.



Teachers are continuing to administer Smarter Balanced Interim Assessments that are linked to the critical content are standards in Mathematics and English/Language Arts. District teachers are spending more time teaching our rigorous curriculum and examining students' mastery of the content and related skills in each subject area. A few days ago, the Connecticut State Department of Education (CSDE) released additional information about student performance in the Spring 2016 assessments. This newly released report contained data that described student and district performance in several categories. East Granby's students outperformed many other students in schools both in and out of our District Reference Group (DRG). This evidences that the great majority of our students are achieving and exceeding the established levels of performance. That being said, we continue to work extensively with students to achieve their growth targets, particularly in English/Language Arts and Mathematics.

In a few short weeks, students will take Connecticut's standardized tests. Again, the CSDE is making every effort to reduce state testing time and help district teachers to spend more time teaching, thereby expanding learning time for students. In the 2017 Assessments, in grades 3-8, there will be the online portion with questions focused on measuring students' mastery of mathematical concept and skills as well as students' competence in English/Language Arts. These Assessments are important in that they help us identify key areas for improvement in our curriculum and instruction. We continue to analyze the data to extract meaning from the student performance results and integrate that information in the adjustments to our educational program to increase students' mastery of content and skills in each subject taught. The results from the CSDE clearly reported the growth targets for students. Learning is not static and the performance expectations increase at each grade level as the subject matter gets more complex the required demonstrations of mastery become more sophisticated.

We will continue with laser like focus to ensure that all of our students' subgroups exceed the anticipated performance levels. The educators in our district have examined and analyzed the data at a very granular level and have put in place processes to assist each learner whose performance indicates a need for further direct intervention. We are committed to helping every learner become intellectually agile and perform at high levels. The CSDE website has extensive reports on student and district performance on the 2016 tests.

We continue to celebrate our achievements in the district. A mid-year report of our progress in addressing the goals in our Areas of Focus is included in this edition of *The Insider*. I am pleased to share that:

East Granby High School students have again demonstrated laudable performance on the College Boards' Advanced Placement examination. We recognize East Granby High School for the increased number of students taking the AP exams and earning a score of 3 or higher and 3 college credits. East Granby High School placed 6<sup>th</sup> out of 121 high schools in the state for participation and 12<sup>th</sup> out of 121 schools for performance;

East Granby Public School elementary students have been invited again – for a record three years - to display Art work in all display areas at Bradley International Airport for the remainder of this school year;





We continue to purposefully integrate technology in the teaching and learning process. We ensure that all students have opportunities to utilize technology to enhance learning and to complete computerized assessments throughout the school year; and



Several teachers in the East Granby Public Schools recently received mini-grant awards made possible by the funds received from Rockbestos Suprenant Cable Corporation to support the effective implementation of the curriculum. Teachers use the funds to enrich and enhance the educational program in East Granby's schools.

## Areas of Focus for the 2016-2017 School Year MID YEAR UPDATE

#### Improve Student Performance, Increase Academic Rigor, and Implement State Requirements

At the beginning of the school year, the Superintendent and each administrator prepared a 100 Day Plan identifying the critical steps necessary in the first 100 days of school to achieve key aspects of major goals, objectives and action plans established to ensure implementation of the school improvement process.

The goals and objectives in the SIPs were identified by the educators in each school and are aligned with the Areas of Focus for the 2016-2017 school year. The leadership team also continued participation in year II of Mastery Based learning workshops to learn more specific steps to implement Mastery Based Teaching to help students achieve and demonstrate Mastery of content and skills.

The segments below share information about accomplishments in each of the targets in the Areas of Focus laid out for 2016-2017.

# Implement research supported best practices and a variety of resources to improve instruction and student performance in Reading, assess student understanding and knowledge of content in complex texts, and enable students to demonstrate higher performance levels.

- Edivate was introduced at the beginning of the school year to all faculty members. Atlas Rubicon was also implemented for curriculum mapping. Faculty members have had several training opportunities since the beginning of the school year.
- ✓ Students performed well on the Spring 2016 state assessments performing at levels higher that other districts in the DRGs
- ✓ Teachers College trainers continue to provide training and support for teachers in the elementary and middle schools.

## Continue efforts to increase rigor in the Fifth-Year High School Associates in Science in Advanced Manufacturing Technology Degree Program and expand the partnership

- ✓ New Courses in Engineering I and II were written and are being taught
- ✓ The Fall Meeting of the Advisory Board was held in November.
- ✓ The Superintendent and Curriculum Director attended workshops sponsored by the CSDE to explain the new Unpaid Experiential Learning Program (UELP). An application to participate in the program was submitted to the CSDE and was approved.
- ✓ A CTE Fifth Year Program Committee has been established to ensure coordination and collaboration to ensure success of the program
- ✓ Businesses in the Bradley Chamber of Commerce received a letter from the school district inviting their support for the UELP
- ✓ Meetings were also held with Dean Stefanowicz and school personnel to discuss articulated courses
- ✓ EGPS represented on Bradley Chamber of Commerce Board
- ✓ The district has now established an Associates Degree in Business through the partnership with Asnuntuck Community College
- ✓ The Superintendent and Director of Curriculum also taught a Curriculum and Instruction Mini-Course to ACC Instructors

## Improve Student and School Performance emphasizing Connecticut Core Standards, intensive learning intervention opportunities, and Mastery Based and Personalized Learning.

- ✓ Interim Smarter Balanced Assessments are being administered to better identify areas where students need to increase their mastery of the standards
- ✓ High Impact Teaching practices and Mastery Based strategies are being emphasized in classes
- ✓ Strategic Thinking sessions were held in late fall and early winter to define the Intellectually and Technologically Agile Learner. Business partners from Office Depot participated in the discussions and supported the effort at the Community Forum.
- ✓ AP and On-Line courses continue at the high school. We are currently exploring Computer Science with a consultant who is also a teacher and parent

#### **Technology Integration**

Expand the use of technology to utilize a wider variety of online learning resources and formative assessments to transform teaching and enhance student progress toward achieving learning goals.

✓ Technology is widely used in all curricular areas and at all grade levels to increase student learning and for formative and summative assessments

Expand efforts of the Library Media Curriculum and Technology Integration Specialist (LMCTS) to ensure the purposeful integration of technology in instruction, particularly in Reading, MET, and in the on-going efforts to revise the curriculum and support implementation.

✓ The LMCTS is included in Curriculum Meetings and is working with ACC faculty. The LMCTS is also working with students to develop and complete their Capstone projects. We have successfully expanded the job embedded training for teachers to assist them in fully integrating technology to transform teaching and learning.

Continue to implement strategies to upgrade the school library to support 21st century learning.

✓ As a district we are continuing to make progress in this area. Makerspaces are being established to allow students and faculty to engage in innovative thinking and creative design and development

Provide training in the use of Edivate as a professional learning platform and newly acquired technologies to access resources to enhance teaching and learning, and provide opportunities for students to practice and improve academic performance.

✓ All faculty and administrators have been trained in Edivate and are currently accessing resources for job-embedded professional development meeting CSDE expectations for continuing professional learning for all of CT educators.

#### Communication

Share educational resources and research supported best practices information with faculty and administration to further enhance and support teaching and learning.

This is an ongoing exercise. Articles on best practices are shared with administrators at weekly meetings, faculty and staff. Administrators are engaged in a rigorous book study protocol, and participating in Mastery Based Learning workshops. Educators continue to participate in TC RWW and curriculum work to transition to the New Generation Science Standards (NGSS). A Shared Resources report was produced for the towns' Shared Resources Committee. Information is routinely shared in *The Insider* newsletter and *Lets Talk Turkey*. Each school also publishes a newsletter and weekly notices.

Upgrade the district website and on-line platforms to improve school operations and professional learning by instituting Edivate, Atlas Rubicon (formerly Curriculum Mapper), and Plus Portals.

✓ The district website was updated to Plus Portals and the broadcast capability was shifted to Admin Plus Portal. Atlas Rubicon has replaced Curriculum Mapper and Edivate was instituted for on-going professional learning.

Engage district administrators and school board members in video recorded conversations about the schools, educational program, and the school budget.

✓ GCTV Sessions are being recorded in the month of March. A successful Community forum was held on January 26, 2017

#### Leadership and Professional Development

Engage administrators in on-going study of best practices in school leadership, especially in the area of effective teacher observation and evaluation.

✓ Instruction observation rounds are in progress. There was an orientation and review of the teacher evaluation protocol at the beginning of the school year, and MBL training and implementation is in progress

Provide on-going opportunities for professional learning in technology applications that support teaching and learning.

✓ Edivate and other resources shared with faculty and administration

Provide opportunities for focused professional learning through participation in a variety of Edivate webinars related to "Leadership to Ensure Coherence", and implementation of leadership strategies that incorporate the latest research in cognitive sciences.

Book Studies focused on the above topics are on-going. Titles include: Teacher As Architect; Excellence Through Equity; The Teenage Brain; The Adolescent Brain; and 21 Trends for the 21st Century

#### Community Support for Our Public Schools

The Board of Education is immersed in the process to prepare and secure a budget that will sustain the school district's effort to provide high quality learning experiences to develop intellectually and technologically agile learners for the 21<sup>st</sup> century. The East Granby Board of Finance, at its meeting on February 7, 2017, directed the Board of Education to prepare a budget that reflects a 1.5% increase over the current year. On the 21<sup>st</sup>, the Board of Finance held a special meeting to review the town's finances in light of the Governor's proposed budget. Adequate funding for the 2017-2018 school year is an important prerequisite to continue achieving the educational goals established for all of East Granby's students. We have expanded our efforts to establish new business partnerships, work diligently to identify sources of grant funding, in-kind services, cooperative learning opportunities and professional development for members of our learning community. We continue to strengthen existing partnerships with the business community and higher education to help ensure that our students graduate from the East Granby Public Schools demonstrating mastery and learning agility, and with significant credentials earned while engaged in our superior educational program.

I encourage you to participate in the conversation and the efforts to ensure that students in the East Granby Public Schools continue to excel as they immerse themselves in learning experiences of the highest caliber. The meeting dates and times for budget discussions are published in the district newsletter and are on line at the district website. ### East Granby Fire Marshal's Office Safety Tips

#### SAFETY TIPS FOR POSSIBLE ELECTRICAL PROBLEMS

- A light bulb that burns out frequently is a sign that the bulb is too high a wattage for the fixture.
- If the lights flicker and dim every time an appliance is turned on, the circuit is overloaded or has a loose connection.
- If sparks appear when a plug is inserted or removed, it could be a sign of loose connections.
- If an electrical cord is warm to the touch, the cord is under-rated or defective.
- If circuit breakers keep tripping, or there are frequent blown fuses, this is a warning sign of problems.
- Improperly installed and/or rated electrical devices, such as switches or receptacles and loose connections at the devices, can lead to arcing and fires.
- Always be sure the correct size of fuses is installed. The fuse is a safety device designed to limit the electricity carried to a safe level.
- Always be sure that electrical devices installed outdoors are designed especially for outdoor use. Outdoor receptacles, as well as those in kitchens, bathrooms and anywhere near water, should be the ground fault circuit interrupting type (GFCI).
- Only extension cords that are rated for the power used by the device they will be powering. Never use extension cords as a long-term solution to the need for another receptacle.
- An extension cord should never be connected to another extension cord or power strip.

#### **NEW OPEN BURNING PERMIT PROCESS**

The East Granby Fire Marshal's Office has been assigned the duties of the Open Burning Official for the Town of East Granby. As a result of this change, there are a few modifications to the process required for obtaining an open burning permit for brush. The permit fee has remained the same at \$25 and should be made payable to the Town of East Granby. Our office is part time so please plan ahead for days that you would like to conduct the burning in order to obtain the needed permit.

Open burning permit applications and copies of our guidelines are available at the First Selectman's Office or the Fire Marshal's Office. The permit will only be valid once the burn site has been inspected and the open burning official has signed the permit. It is still the responsibility of the resident to follow the Town of East Granby's guidelines for open burning.

# A COUPLE OF RECALLED ITEMS FROM THE U.S. CONSUMER PRODUCT SAFETY COMMISSION

Residents should be aware of a couple of products which were recently recalled by the U.S Consumer Product Safety Commission. The Consumer Product Safety Commission maintains a database of recalled products for consumers, their website is www.cpsc.gov and I encourage residents to occasionally visit the website to review any recalls.

#### • STIHL Recalls Chain Saws Due to Fire and Burn Hazards

This recall involves STIHL MS 461 gas-powered chain saws, and the MS 461 R chain saw with a wrap handle. The model number is located on the model plate which is on the starter cover. The chain saws are gray and orange with "STIHL" on the engine cover. Recalled chain saws have a serial number between 173092800 and 181993952, under the front hand guard on the engine housing's sprocket side.

The fuel lines on these units can leak sparking a fire.

Consumers should immediately stop using these saws and return them to an authorized STIHL dealer for an inspection and repair.

#### • Panasonic Lithium Ion Battery Packs

There is a large recall of Panasonic Lithium Ion battery packs that are used in laptop computers. This recall spans many manufacturers including Sony, HP, Toshiba, and Compaq. Please visit the Consumer Product Safety Commission's website to see if your product is affected by this recall. Each manufacturer has enacted a recall under their respective names for this and can be looked up in that manner on the website.

#### DAYLIGHT SAVINGS TIME

A simple reminder to all residents that daylight savings time occurred on March 12th of this year and it is a time where you should be checking your smoke detectors and replacing batteries in them. The East Granby Fire Marshal's Office provides this service free of charge to our residents. A smoke detector has a life span of 10 years; if your detector is battery operated and is over 10 years old we will replace the detector free of charge for you. 


