Happy Thanksgiving!

With the proverbial "nip in the air" and the calendar rapidly advancing, I wish everyone and their families a Happy Thanksqiving. November is always a busy time of year and here are some items of interest:

What Does the Absence of a State Budget Mean to East Granby? As I write this column, the state still does not have a budget for the current fiscal year. In spite of state difficulties, East Granby's finances remain in good shape and our Moody's bond rating remains at a healthy Aa2. The Fiscal Year 17-18 town budget was approved at our May 3rd referendum and assumed a net \$900,000 reduction in state revenue to East Granby and operating budgets that increased slightly over 1%. Recent press reports indicate that while state revenue for East Granby will probably be lower than the 16-17 fiscal year, it may not be reduced as drastically as previously thought.

Town Emergency Shelter & Citizen Alert System: The Senior/Community Center is the Town's Emergency Shelter during times of prolonged power outages. Please call the Selectman's Office at (860) 413-3301 if you rely on electricity for life-saving equipment such as oxygen. Important numbers to remember are 911 for emergencies and 211 for statewide information regarding what's available for emergency support during winter storms. To be automatically notified in case of emergency go to www.eastgranbyct.org and click on the Citizen Alert button in the middle of the page. You can receive emergency notifications via e-mails, home phones, or cell phones.

Free Residential LED Lightbulb Swap: The Town has received a \$5,000 "Bright Ideas" Grant from Eversource which will allow us to help residents save energy and money! The light bulb swap is tentatively planned to be held at the East Granby Town Hall Meeting Room on Saturday, December 2nd from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Residents can bring in up to five standard incandescent light bulbs and receive five replacement LED bulbs at zero cost to the resident. As we get closer to the event, Eversource will notify residents through a mailing and the town will publicize on the town website: www.eastgranbyct.org.

Veterans Day Appreciation Dinner: Resilience Grows Here (RGH) – Veterans & Community. Together We Thrive. RGH and the Town of East Granby invite all veterans plus one guest to an evening of celebrating Veterans Day and everything that we have in common. Municipal Elections - Tuesday, November 7th: This year's municipal elections are going to be held on Tuesday, November 7th at our polling place, the Senior/Community Center. The polls will be open from 6:00 AM to 8:00 PM. This year's election will decide the following positions: State Judge of Probate; and on the local level First Selectman, Board of Selectmen, Board of Finance, Board of Education, Board of Assessment Appeals, and the Planning and Zoning Commission. Please don't forget to exercise your right to vote. For questions regarding the election or absentee ballots please contact the Town Clerk's office at (860) 653-6528.

Leaf Pick-Up: There will be a town-wide leaf pick-up on November 18th. Please use the brown leaf bags sold at hardware stores and leave them at curb-side (no private roads) no later than 7:00 AM on Saturday the 18th.

Bradley International Airport Master Plan: Every ten years the airport updates its master plan. This plan guides the airport's development and operational sustainability and covers 5-,10-, and 20year horizons. The purpose of the master plan is to plan for future modernization, expansion, and to meet foreseeable aviation demand and customer needs. East Granby Revaluation

The revaluation firm Vision Government Solutions has been hired by East Granby to perform a town wide revaluation as mandated by the State of Connecticut every five years. Over the next several months, representatives from Vision will be verifying information currently on file with the Assessor's Office by visiting every property. They will be seeking the opportunity to measure building exteriors and inspect building interiors for every property.

All Vision representatives will be wearing an identification badge and their cars will be clearly marked with magnetic signs. They, and their cars, will be registered with the police department. Homeowners are encouraged to see identification prior to admitting anyone into their homes. Any homeowner who has a question concerning the identity of a Vision representative can call the Assessor's Office at (860) 653-2852 or the police.

Veterans Tax Exemption

As a veteran, you may be eligible for a real estate or motor vehicle tax exemption. There is no age restriction. There is no length of residency requirement. There is no need to contact the Veterans Administration. You only need to be a resident who is an honorably discharged veteran, and whose time of service includes a specific period of war or conflict. You only need to contact the Assessor's Office to find out if you are eligible. And then you only need to file your original discharge papers in the Town Clerk's Office.

Have you misplaced your original discharge papers? The above offices can tell you how to acquire a replacement original online. It's very easy. Have you tried before to get this exemption and were you told that your time of service did not fall within the specific war or conflict dates? Please contact us again as these dates have been expanded in recent years to include more of you.

Plus...if you have a VA disability rating of 10% or more, you are eligible for a higher exemption. This is also true for those of you who are already receiving this exemption. You only need to bring your VA rating document to the Assessor.

Lastly, veterans, this exemption has been created by Connecticut state statute. It is earned by honorable military service during a time of war or conflict. Do not assume you are ineligible to receive it. Please contact the Assessor's Office at (860) 653-2852 for more information.

East Granby Cemetery Association

In the previous *Let's Talk Turkey* article, we spoke about the history of Arlington National Cemetery, the most famous cemetery in the country and the resting place for many of our nation's greatest heroes. More than 300,000 veterans of every American conflict, from the Revolutionary War to Iraq and Afghanistan, are buried there. Let's explore some interesting facts about the cemetery.

The nps.gov site tells us that on average, 28 burials occur each weekday, for a total of nearly 6,900 each year. Flags at Arlington



National Cemetery are flown at half-staff from 30 minutes prior to the first funeral until 30 minutes past the last funeral.

Christopher Klein of the History Channel shares the following: "In 1868, General John A. Logan, commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, officially proclaimed May 30 as Decoration Day 'for the purpose of strewing with flowers or otherwise decorating the graves of comrades who died in defense of their country during the late rebellion.' The first commemoration took place at Arlington on May 30, 1868, with General Ulysses S. Grant in attendance and General James Garfield as the featured speaker. Decoration Day was eventually renamed Memorial Day.

Soldiers plant flags in front of every tombstone on Memorial Day weekend. On every Memorial Day weekend since 1948, troops in the 3rd U.S. Infantry Regiment—the Army's official ceremonial unit known as the 'Old Guard'—have placed small American flags in front of all of Arlington's tombstones. Each flag is planted precisely one foot in front of a grave marker and perfectly centered. This year, 1,700 soldiers participated in the tradition known as 'Flag-In.' They planted approximately 220,000 flags on the Thursday evening before Memorial Day and they were removed at the holiday's conclusion.

Nearly 4000 former slaves are buried at Arlington National Cemetery. After seizing Lee's estate, the federal government set aside acreage in June 1863 to be a model community for emancipated, freed, and fugitive slaves. Freedman's Village included farmland, homes, a hospital, a school, and a mess hall before shuttering in 1900. African-Americans who lived at the village were buried on the property, and their graves were incorporated into Section 27 of Arlington National Cemetery.

Three World War II enemy combatants are buried at Arlington National Cemetery. Scattered among America's honored dead are two Italian prisoners of war and one German prisoner of war captured during World War II. The three enemy combatants died in captivity in the Washington, D.C. area, and the Geneva Conventions required proper burials. With Arlington being the closest national cemetery, the men were buried there. In total, there are approximately 60 foreign nationals buried in Arlington, most being allied servicemen who perished in air disasters that included American soldiers.

There may never be another addition to the Tomb of the Unknowns. An unknown from the Vietnam War was entombed in 1984 but the remains were exhumed in 1998 and positively identified by DNA testing. Advancements in DNA testing may mean that all future remains will be able to be positively identified and no future interments at the Tomb of the Unknowns will occur."

We hope you have enjoyed these interesting facts about the most famous cemetery in our country. The East Granby Cemetery Association oversees the maintenance and preservation of our own little cemetery right here in East Granby! Capitol Update

Rep. Tami Zawistowski, 61st District

Since the last issue of *Let's Talk Turkey*, there has been some movement but no resolution in adopting a state budget. In the early morning hours of September 15th, we finally had the opportunity to vote on a budget. The proposal put forward by the majority party included over \$1.5 billion in new taxes, including a tax on cell phones, secondary homes, rental cars, hotels, and numerous other fees. In response, Republicans put forward an alternate budget as an amendment, which was adopted with bipartisan support, 21-15 in the Senate and 77-73-1 in the House. This proposal was a revised version of the budget first drafted by the Republican caucuses in April, which included targeted spending reductions while fully funding local education. Not long after passage, Governor Malloy vetoed the budget.

At the time of writing, Connecticut is the only state in the country without a budget in place. Back in August, Governor Malloy introduced an executive order that would go into effect October 1st in the absence of a budget. Under this order East Granby faces a 100% cut to its education funding, meaning about \$1.5 million less for our local schools, as well as other municipal cuts.

In addition, East Granby would need to pay the state more than \$60,000 for a portion of teacher pensions, something that has historically been a state responsibility. This is unacceptable. As of this date, negotiations continue with full participation of leadership from both parties—with some areas of common ground identified and some agreements in principle reached. But as details emerge from those negotiations, the Governor continues his threats to veto anything that does not meet his own ideas of what would constitute a good budget. This has not been helpful to the negotiating process.

Beyond the state's fiscal woes, there are good things happening right here in our community. There has been significant progress at Old Newgate Prison, and the museum has been open to the public for special events, including a two-day Halloween bash this month. I am very happy that the Department of Economic and Community Development (DECD) is now fully supporting reopening this historical landmark, recognizing not only its past history of operating with positive cash flow, but that is a significant tourism draw that will create economic opportunities in East Granby and surrounding areas.

October is Manufacturing Month, and this is an area where East Granby shines. On October 19th, I toured RSCC Wire & Cable and its research arm, Marmon Innovation and Technology, both now part of Berkshire Hathaway. RSCC is a manufacturer of heavy duty cables serving mainly the energy and transportation markets. They are a major employer in north central Connecticut and in 2018 they will be celebrating 100 years in business. I am proud that they have chosen to stay and grow here in East Granby. On October 20th I visited with another local manufacturer, Joining Technologies, which specializes in machining and laser welding. They are celebrating 25 years of innovation and growth in East Granby.

Concerned Taxpayers of East Granby

Concerned Taxpayers of East Granby is a non-partisan organization for East Granby taxpayers to promote a balance of town spending versus quality of services and affordability of living in town. CTEG promotes involvement of taxpayers in town government decision-making to ensure the economic viability of our community.

At a time of potentially historic cuts in Connecticut state aid to towns necessitated by the state's disastrous fiscal condition (49th out of the 50 states), budget season in East Granby ended with a 1.25% expansion of town spending: approval of teachers' and school administrators' contracts with annual 3% raises, a 4.04% property tax increase reflecting a \$900,000 reduction in state aid plus drawing down the town's "savings account" to the minimum 10% cash reserve required by the ratings agencies.

At the state level, economic policy has led to population and major corporate exits from Connecticut, resulting in erosion of income tax receipts and a nearly 25% budget shortfall. Governor Malloy has attempted to solve the state fiscal calamity by making a deal with state unions and extending a host of extravagant government union benefits through 2027.

Despite that, the state has been without a budget for an unprecedented 108 days. As a result, last Friday, Standard & Poor's Global Ratings downgraded its outlook for Connecticut's general obligation bonds to "negative." According to S&P, the outlook change reflects increasing constraints on Connecticut achieving long-term structural balance, because of slow economic growth, recent population decline, and in particular, reduced revenue-raising flexibility after substantial tax increases were instituted in the last two biennial budgets. Further, the recent agreement with state labor unions creates a fixed pay schedule and prohibits layoffs for the next four years while fixed debt service and pension costs are rising. S&P voiced additional concern that state aid cuts could diminish Connecticut's long-term economic attractiveness, and threatened to further lower Connecticut's rating if economic growth continues to weaken.

Other issues currently in the works in East Granby town government are changes to the town ordinances, and the revision of East Granby's ten-year Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD). Updates are available from the office of the First Selectman, or the Planning and Zoning Commission, respectively, both in town hall (http://eastgranbyct.org/, (860) 653-2576, info@egtownhall.com).

Municipal elections for town offices will be held this year on election day, November 7th. Get out and support your candidate—or better, run for office yourself, to give the town electorate real choice! We need to reign in town spending in order prepare for major cuts in state spending. Vote in the referendums, municipal elections, and at town meetings. In East Granby, every vote counts, literally referendums, elections, and town meeting votes are often decided by margins of as little as two to four votes! If you want your voice to be heard on matters of the town budget, municipal governance, POCD, or other issues, go to Board meetings and public hearings and show Board and Commission members that you're watching and will hold them accountable. Do whatever you can to help keep our town government oriented responsibly and encourage them to put together a good strong economic development profile for the community. Come to a CTEG meeting to talk with likeminded neighbors and discuss your ideas.

All CTEG meetings are on the third Monday of the month at 7:00 PM at the East Granby Public Library. Our next meeting will be Monday, November 20th. All CTEG meetings are open to the public. Come and find out what's going on in the community. Share your thoughts and concerns with people who are interested in keeping East Granby a great place to live, work, and retire. Board of Education Efficiency Study

On June 14th, the East Granby Board of Education published



in the Message to the East Granby Community, the conclusions drawn from the findings and responses to the recommendations of the Efficiency Study commissioned in 2015. The Board of Education's full report may be viewed at https://www.eastgranby.k12.ct.us/board-

education/efficiency-study-2015/.

Highlighted in the Board's report are the conclusions that:

- (1) regarding recommendation 2.2, there is no excess capacity in the high school—gymnasiums, auditorium, library, eating commons, and laboratories account for a large portion of the square footage in these spaces that are shared with the middle school on a daily basis; and
- (2) regarding recommendation 2.3, of the neighboring districts contacted, none were interested in engaging in the extensive process to form a "regional" high school as defined in state statute. Copies of the full report are also available at the East Granby Library, Town Clerk's Office, Selectman's Office, and the Board of Education Offices.



East Granby Public Schools - Your Schools in the News - October 2017

The 2017 – 2018 school year is filled with anticipation of positive outcomes of all our initiatives launched at the beginning of the year and planned for the second half of the year. Our new district Vision, Mission, Belief Statements, Goals and Areas of Focus have been widely shared with the community. Administrators and faculty are aligning their goals for the school year with those in the Areas of Focus document. This alignment will ensure that as a district, each member of our school community will be successful.

This year we are also placing significant interest on highly focused job embedded professional learning that will enhance curriculum implementation and the integration of competency – based instructional strategies that will enable students to demonstrate mastery of skills and competencies.

Members in our learning community will also work to engage students in activities to develop and hone critical leadership skills using modules from a new and highly respected K – 12 curriculum standards aligned leadership program. Students at Carl Allgrove School will learn and practice leadership skills embedded in the Responsive Classroom protocol. At R. D. Seymour School, students will also experience leadership training in Responsive Classroom. Additionally, they will gain key knowledge and skills as they participate in Student Council and other opportunities to study leadership. At East Granby Middle School, students will continue to engage with the iLEAD 21 Program enhanced by the integration of modules aligned with the standards in each curricular area from the new grades 6 – 8 leadership curriculum. At East Granby High School, students will experience the leadership curriculum in two ways: students will study leadership in the required course; and will engage in the study of leadership in each curricular area. For example, a student may study leadership by examining the leadership structures and practices of world leaders past and present. Administrators are also examining leadership from a more thoughtful level and will better understand how to demonstrate agility as they develop, hone and implement best practices in their daily work.

Another important area of emphasis will be the integration of competency based teaching and learning practices to equip students to demonstrate mastery of curricular content and skills. Administrators are participating in a Systemic transformation workshop series that places heavy emphasis on competency based approaches to develop agile learners. The entire faculty will also be following through on integrating mastery based instructional strategies that give students opportunities to strengthen their conceptual understanding, practice and hone skills, and use rubrics as they apply and demonstrate knowledge. Teacher's efforts in the classroom will be supported by the work of Rick Wormeli who led a professional learning session in late June. Administrators who participated in a similar workshop session last school year will also guide and support the implementation of mastery based best practices.

As a district, we are also examining the impact of Mindsets on Student Performance and will implement practices to strengthen the positive learning climate in our schools. On October 6, 2017, we spent the entire day learning more about how mindset can cause students to engage in or disengage from the learning process. During the learning session, faculty and administrators spent time examining their instructional practices, classroom communication, and implementation practices that either enhance or negate student's effort to learn and embrace new knowledge and learning opportunities. Guidance counselors will include the discussion of Mindsets in their developmental guidance sessions, faculty at the elementary level have begun to review how they give feedback on report cards, and all faculty will focus on giving timely instructive feedback that will help students and parents to focus specifically on the areas of growth. These practices will enable students and intervention specialists to better guide students to improvement as they are encouraged to focus on specific content, skills, and competencies. We believe that this combined emphasis on developing positive mindsets and focus on mastery will enhance student performance. Accordingly, the School Improvement Plan for each school reflects the integration of these two elements – developing positive mindsets and focus on mastery (school goals are attached).

In the continued quest to help our students earn advantageous credentials, I recently presented to administrators, faculty, and counselors information about two new opportunities that will confirm and officially acknowledge our students' global acumen. A Certificate/Seal of Bi-literacy was recently endorsed by the Connecticut State

Department of Education, and a Global Competency Certificate is anticipated to be available to students who produce evidence of engagement in the specified language courses, projects, and activities while in grades 9-12. These certificates are well aligned with our goal to ensure that East Granby's intellectually and technologically agile learners possess the global acumen that will be extremely important to their future success.

At the last regular meeting of the East Granby Board of Education, members welcomed two new student representatives – Ivana Prats and Ryan Trombly. The students will attend the first board meeting of the month and share information about the schools. At the October 23, 2017 meeting of the Board of Education, administrators will share information about 2016-2017 student performance. In November 2017, the Board of Education will also recognize school community volunteers at the Fall Community Recognition Ceremony. The East Granby School Choir and Band will perform for the ceremony that will be recorded for airing on GCTV. Recently, we shared information that East Granby was placed in demographic reference group B, (DRG, B) based on economic indicators such as median household income, median home value, and above average student performance. The full list may be viewed on the school district website.

Your continued support of the East Granby Public Schools is vital to the success of our students and educators, and to the strength and vitality of the East Granby community. We look forward to continuing our school community and business partnerships.



East Granby Fire Marshal's Office Safety Tips

HALLOWEEN SAFETY

The celebration of Halloween on October 31st each year can be a great source of fun for residents of all ages, but it also generates unique hazards for residents as well. Public safety works diligently every year to ensure that the safest environment possible is provided for this holiday. The following is an important but simple list of items that residents can do to help us keep them safe:

- Battery operated devices should be used for illumination instead of open flames (e.g., pumpkins, decorations, etc.).
- Costumes and clothing should not be made of flammable materials, susceptive to heat or open flame. They should always be made of flame resistant or flame-retardant fabric.
- Anyone trick or treating or accompanying trick or treating children in the evening or nighttime when visibility is low should wear light colored clothing or clothing that will reflect light.
- No open flames (e.g., candles) should ever be carried while trick or treating and a flashlight should always be carried by those walking.

<u>U.S. CONSUMER PRODUCT</u> SAFETY COMMISSION RECALL

In each edition, I look for relevant recalls or safety notices from manufacturers to pass along to residents. The Consumer Product Safety Commission maintains a database of recalled products for consumers; their website is www.cpsc.gov. I encourage residents to occasionally visit the website to review any recalls and product safety problems.

Outlet Converters Recalled by Nignbo Litesun Electric with Home Depot Due to Shock and Fire Hazards:

This recall involves commercial electric 15-amp triplex outlet converters, also known as taps, with model # LA-05 and UPC 818897010121. The white plastic converters convert a single electrical outlet into three outlets. On the front facing outlet, neutral and line (power socket) sizes are reversed. The model number is printed on the mold on the side that the prongs are located and the UPC number is printed on a sticker on the top of the converter along with the UL listing.

Residents should immediately stop using the recalled outlet converters and contact Home Depot for a full refund. Home Depot can be reached at 1-877-527-0313 for this recall. Residents should also be mindful that these types of electrical converters can lead to overloading circuits. Power strips, extension cords, and surge protectors have to be plugged directly into their own dedicated outlet and must never be connected together.

CHANGE YOUR CLOCK, CHANGE YOUR BATTERY

As daylight savings time approaches it is time to change batteries in your smoke and carbon monoxide detectors. After ten years of age, all detectors need to be changed. Holiday Decoration Safety Recommendations:

- 1. Before natural trees are set up, the trunk should be sawed off above the original cut, set in a stand, and tap water added. This initial fresh cut opens up the sap channels in the tree so that it can take up water. Keep your tree stand water level above the cut in the trunk to prevent the tree from forming a sap seal. A sap sealed tree trunk will not draw water which is needed for it to remain fresh.
- 2. All trees should be held upright in sturdy stands having a base that is sufficiently broad enough to effectively support the tree. Guy wires may be needed to steady oversized trees.
- Natural trees having root balls should be moistened daily and cut natural trees should be placed in containers of water sufficient to provide at least a one-day supply. A container holding at least one quart per inch in stem diameter is recommended.
- 4. Natural trees should remain indoors only for as long a period of time as they are fresh. Cut trees are thirsty! Depending on tree size, they may use from two pints to one and one-half gallons or more per day—so make sure to check the water level daily and supply fresh water as needed. Remove any tree that shows evidence of drying or severe shedding.
- 5. All trees and decorations should be located a safe distance from sources of heat such as heaters, fireplaces, stoves, television sets, candles and the like. NEVER DECORATE YOUR TREE WITH CANDLES!!!
- 6. Overloaded electrical outlets and faulty wires are a common cause of holiday-related accidents. Worn-out electrical cords and plugs should be replaced. Avoid too many plugs in one outlet. Use multi-outlet power strips when running many applications or decorative light screens.
- 7. All sources of electric lighting, both direct and indirect, should be in good condition and consist of equipment that has been tested and labeled or listed for the specific purpose by a recognized testing laboratory. All lighting should be turned off or better yet, disconnected, when the area is unattended. This is especially important in residential occupancies when the occupants are asleep.

WINTER SAFETY TIPS FOR YOUR HOME

Wood Stoves and Fireplaces:

- Be sure the stove or fireplace is installed properly. Woodstoves should have adequate clearance (36") from combustible surfaces, and proper floor support and protection.
- Woodstoves should be of good quality, solid construction and design, and should be UL listed.

East Granby Fire Marshal's Office Safety Tips

- Have the chimney inspected annually and cleaned if necessary, especially if it has not been used for some time.
- Do not use flammable liquids to start or accelerate any fire.
- Keep a glass or metal screen in front of the fireplace opening, to prevent embers or sparks from jumping out, unwanted material from going in, and help prevent the possibility of burns to occupants.
- The stove should be burned hot twice a day for 15-30 minutes to reduce the amount of creosote buildup.
- Don't use excessive amounts of paper to build roaring fires in fireplaces. It is possible to ignite creosote in the chimney by overbuilding the fire.
- Never burn charcoal indoors. Burning charcoal can give off lethal amounts of carbon monoxide (CO).
- Keep flammable materials away from your mantel. A spark from the fireplace could ignite these materials.
- Before you go to sleep, be sure your fireplace fire is out.
 <u>NEVER</u> close your damper with hot ashes in the fireplace. A closed damper will help the fire heat up again and will force toxic carbon monoxide (CO) into the house.
- If synthetic logs are used, follow the directions on the package. Never break a synthetic log apart to quicken the fire or use more than one log at a time. They often burn unevenly, releasing higher levels of carbon monoxide.

Furnace Heating:

- It's important that you have your furnace inspected to ensure that it is in good working condition.
- Be sure all furnace controls and emergency shutoffs are in proper working condition.
- Leave furnace repairs to qualified specialists. Do not attempt repairs yourself unless you are qualified.
- Inspect the walls and ceiling near the furnace and along the chimney line. If the wall is hot or discolored, additional pipe insulation or clearance may be required.
- Check the flue pipes and pipe seams. Are they well supported? Free of holes, and cracks? Soot along or around seams may be an indicator of a leak.
- Is the chimney solid? No cracks or loose bricks? All unused flue openings should be sealed with solid masonry.
- Keep trash and other combustibles away from the heating system.

Other Fire Safety Tips:

- Never discard hot ashes inside or near the home. Place them in a metal container outside and well away from the house.
- Never use a range or an oven as a supplementary heating device. Not only is it a safety hazard, it can be a source of potentially toxic fumes.

- If you use an electric heater, be sure not to overload the circuit. Only use extension cords, which have the necessary rating to carry the amp load.
- Avoid using electric space heaters in bathrooms, or other areas where they may come in contact with water.
- Frozen water pipes? Never try to thaw them with a blowtorch or other open flames (otherwise the pipe could conduct the heat and ignite the wall structure inside the wall space). Use hot water or a UL labeled device such as a hand-held dryer for thawing.
- If windows are used as emergency exits in your home, practice using them in the event fire should strike. Be sure that all windows open easily. Home escape ladders are recommended.
- If there is a fire hydrant near your home you can assist the fire department by keeping the hydrant clear of snow so in the event it is needed, it can be located.
- Keep all doorways/exits free from snow in case you need to use them in an emergency.

Finally:

- Be sure every level of your home has a working smoke detector, and be sure to check and clean it on a monthly basis. Smoke detectors should be replaced every 10 years.
- Have a working CO detector in your home.
- Consult your local building official and fire marshal before making any changes that will affect your furnace room or, if you suspect you have a problem now, contact a state-licensed heating contractor for an evaluation.
- Contact the Fire Department or Fire Marshal's Office for advice if you have any questions on Home Fire Safety.


