Leaf Pick Up: There will be a town-wide leaf pick-up on November 19th. Please use the brown earth bags sold at hardware stores and place them curbside (no private roads) prior to 7:00 AM on Saturday the 19th for free pick up.

Power Outages, Town Emergency Shelter, and Emergency Numbers: The Senior/Community Center is the Town's Emergency Shelter. The Emergency Shelter has food, water, charging stations, and information. Please call the Selectmen's Office at (860) 413-3301 if you rely on electricity for lifesaving equipment such as oxygen. We maintain a confidential list emergency personnel use in the event of a power outage. Important numbers to remember are 911 for emergencies, (860) 653-5385 for non-emergency police matters, and 211 for information regarding what is available for emergency support statewide.

Snowstorm Information: There is no parking allowed on streets during winter storms. This allows our Department of Public Works to clear the roads of snow and ice as soon as possible. Winter parking on the street during mild weather is also restricted between the hours of 12:00 AM and 6:00 AM during the months of November through April.

On a personal note, thank you for your support during my first year in office. I look forward to the second half of my term serving our East Granby community. Please remember my phone line and office door are always open if you wish to communicate any concerns or to stop by for a visit. I would also like to mention the outpouring of support our community has shown to a Ukrainian family who recently relocated to East Granby. Your hospitality has made them feel safe and welcome.

A Payment Drop Box is available 24 hours a day/7 days a week and is located at the back door of the Town Hall facing the Police Department, Library, and Senior/Community Center. You still have an opportunity to mail your payment on February 1, 2023. We accept the United States Postmaster Stamp/Seal as on-time if postmarked by 2/1/23. Sorry, postage meters do not qualify as Postmasters' Stamp/Seal.

In October, the Second Grade Allgrove Elementary class visited the Town Hall. We enjoyed meeting all the second graders and potential future taxpayers here in East Granby. We look forward to seeing the students again if they accompany you to the tax department when paying your bill.

Commission on Aging

The Commission on Aging (COA) hosted a Wellness Fair on October 17th at the East Granby Senior/Community Center. Some 70-80 people attended the Fair, which offered the presence of 26 vendors, including a number of Town agencies. Because of COVID, the Fair had not been held the last two years. People's Bank gave us a generous donation of \$500 towards the Fair, which helped greatly with expenses.

On October 22nd, East Granby Cares Day was held. This was an event accomplished as part of The Good Samaritan Program.

High School students answered the call to help townspeople with chores around the house. This year, we were able to help 11 seniors with 31 high school students participating in the program.

The East Granby Good Samaritan Program is ready and able to help people in town. If you have a need and are looking for help or if you know someone who could use help, contact Senior Services or Social Services to be matched up with our volunteers. East Granby Social Services

East Granby Social Services is located in the Senior/Community Center and office hours are Monday through Thursday from 10:00 AM to 3:00 PM. Drop boxes for Social Services can be found inside the Senior/Community Center and outside the front door of the Town Hall.

Emergency Assistance Fund: The East Granby Emergency Assistance Fund is available to those income eligible residents who are in need of emergency financial assistance with fuel, housing, medical, electric, and other critical needs. The fund is supported solely through donations and gifts from the community and 100% of the funds raised are given back to qualifying



residents who are facing financial hardship. Donations can be made to the "East Granby Emergency Assistance Fund" and mailed to East Granby Social Services, 9 Center Street, East Granby, CT 06026.

Energy Assistance: Applications are being taken at Social Services from residents of East Granby who wish to apply for the Connecticut Energy Assistance Program. This program is designed



to help offset the winter heating costs of Connecticut's lower income households. Winter heating assistance helps pay for a household's primary heating source such as oil, natural gas, electricity, propane, kerosene,

coal, wood, and wood pellets. Please contact Social Services for more information on income limits and requirements or visit the State of Connecticut website, www.ct.gov, and search "Connecticut Energy Assistance Program."

Food Pantry: The Friend to Friend Food Pantry was established to supplement the weekly grocery needs of residents who have been identified by East Granby Social Services as needing

Historical Society Program



On Sunday December 4th at 2:30 PM at the East Granby Public Library, the East Granby Historical Society will present "Beyond the Bicep: The Real Story of Rosie the Riveter" presented by Dr. Amanda Goodheart Parks.



Her image has adorned everything from lunchboxes to lampshades, but what is the real story of Rosie the Riveter? Together we'll trace her iournev propaganda poster to feminist icon while uncovering the history of the real life Rosies who not only inspired that infamous bicep, but whose work in wartime industries helped secure an Allied victory during World War II. Dr. Parks is a public historian whose work can be seen on the History Channel, has been awarded by the American Alliance of Museums, and is featured at museums and historic sites across New England. She specializes in the history of women and gender. The program is free and open to the public (the program will follow a brief 2:00 PM business meeting).

Capitol Update Rep. Tami Zawistowski, 61st District

Thanks to all of you who took the time to vote in the November 8th election, with special thanks to those who volunteered to work at the polls.

The next legislative term will begin January 4th, 2023, with the swearing in of a new General Assembly and statewide constitutional officers. This will kick off a "long session" which will continue until early June. In addition to setting a new biennial budget, legislators will be able to individually propose bills directly rather than relying on committee request letters as required during even-year "short sessions."

I have heard from many people in our area expressing frustration with high prices for everyday goods and services, worries about

crime, and concerns about our quality of life. I plan on submitting legislation to address these issues head-on.

This January the highway use tax is set to go into effect on trucks delivering goods or traveling through our state. Trucks are already heavily taxed and this this additional levy will raise prices on nearly all goods since our supply chain, which keeps food on the shelves at grocery stores, relies on trucking. I will propose legislation to repeal this tax going forward. Additionally, I will propose legislation to reduce income tax rates from 5% to 4% for families making less than \$175,000 per year and index our tax brackets to inflation, increase the property tax credit, eliminate the 1% extra sales tax on meals, and consider the elimination of minor taxes/fees which may cost more money to collect than they provide in revenue.

This past term I was proud to support efforts to reform our juvenile justice system and take steps to reduce catalytic converter theft. This coming term I will push for additional provisions to reduce crime and put victims' rights ahead of criminals. I will propose enhanced penalties for crimes committed using a stolen vehicle or stolen firearms, removal of criminal record erasure for certain violent crimes, and provide adequate funding and resources for the Office of Victim Advocate.

In light of alleged misuse of funds in certain municipalities and state agencies, I also plan on submitting legislation to bring greater transparency to government and oversight of COVID relief money.

If you have additional suggestions for legislation or specific issues you think State government should address, or handle better, please let me know during the bill proposal period prior to the start of session in January.

As this is the last column of the year, I want to extend my best wishes to you and your families a happy and healthy holiday season. 
We will have our annual "Stuff a Cruiser" happening and ask that you bring an unwrapped toy to donate.

The mission of the East Granby Youth Service Bureau is to coordinate the delivery of community-based services for prevention, intervention, treatment, and follow up for at risk youth, and to provide opportunities for all youth to function as responsible members of the community.

Commission on Youth Services

The commission on Youth Services (CYS) has been established to serve in an advisory capacity and support the mission and staff of the Youth Services Bureau. Members are appointed by the board of selectman and represent various segments of the community including law enforcement, education, children and families, and local business and organization. The goal of the CYS is to advocate for our youth population by evaluating priority needs and interests on an ongoing basis and assisting the YSB in the development of appropriate programs and services. Safe@Home Program

The Science of Reading

How Do Children Learn to Read?

In the article "Why Reading is Not a Natural Process" author G.R. Lyon explains that unlike speech, where humans are hard-wired to produce sounds, reading is not natural, but must be taught. As proof, longitudinal studies by the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) with more than 10,000 students since the 1980s confirmed that students learn to read by decoding and comprehension. "Although this sounds simple, learning to read is much tougher than people think. To learn to decode and read printed English, children must be aware that spoken words are composed of individual sound parts termed phonemes. This is what is meant by *phoneme awareness*." (ASCD Org)

What is a Phoneme?

A phoneme is the smallest unit of sounds letters make in a word. In order to have phonemic awareness, a reader needs to be able to hear the sound,

identify the phoneme, and manipulate the phonemes. Keep reading if you'd like to hear how third graders can recognize digraphs!

What is Decoding?

Decoding is when we segment a word into parts or phonemes: take a unit of sound, make the sound, stretch it out, and then blend it back together again. Here is an example: A student sees: **HAT**. Say the sounds for H-A-T. (h-ă-t) Now, stretch it out....hhhhhhhh-ăăăăăă-ttttttt. Next, put it together and say the word: **HAT**.

What is a Decodable Reader?

(Use the QR code at the end for a video)

Decodable readers are special books designed for use with students who are emergent readers. In the past, students might have been told to "look at the pictures" on the page to help them guess the word, leading their eyes away from the letters and not focusing on the word. A decodable reader is story-focused where the pictures augment or enhance the words on the page, and do not reiterate the story through illustrations.



SyllaBoards™ Word Kit from Really Great Reading (3rd Grade, Mrs. Iwanicki's class)

The new reader should use phonemic awareness to sound out the phonemes, stretch the word, put it together and say it. *The cat had on a hat and vest at school.* Since cat, hat, and school are sight words for first grade students, a student may need to decode V-E-S-T. The illustration might show a teacher and a classroom, but not have a solitary drawing of a cat dressed in his fancy attire.

Using decodable readers helps students focus on the words in the story. While all students will still use traditional picture books, decodable readers are an additional tool when students are beginning

their reading journey. East Granby has these for intervention purposes, but as we purchase more decodable readers, you might see them pop up in a book bag!

Scarborough's Rope

To help with understanding how learning to read is an interconnected process, "Dr. Hollis Scarborough created the Reading Rope using pipe cleaners to convey how the different "strands" of reading are all interconnected yet independent of one another. For many students, learning to read is a challenge. Scarborough's Rope captures the complexity of learning to read." (Really Great Reading) The illustration here is from Really Great Reading website, which we use in grade three.

As you can see, reading is a complex process. For initial reading, students need phonological awareness, decoding skills, and sight recognition. Background and literacy knowledge, along with increased vocabulary, language structure, and verbal




This interpretation of the Reading Rope incorporates Gough & Tunmer's (1986) Simple View of Reading.

reasoning. Giving our children opportunities to gain knowledge about the world, having conversations, and reading with them are all ways we can help our students become better readers at home.

Kindergarten

When students enter kindergarten, not all of them know their letters, so an initial unit is learning the alphabet and the sounds letters make. Kindergarten classrooms are filled with rich examples of letters and sounds. Site words, like on the caterpillar pictured below, are all around the room. One fun treat is the Alphabet Parade, held in the hallway after the students learn about the letter Z. They wear paper bag vests covered with letters and pictures.



While the other grades clap and cheer, the kindergarten students march up and down the hall to alphabet-themed songs.

Next, kindergartners memorize common words, as sight recognition is an important strand of reading. Students practice saying them, using words displayed in the classroom. For students in Carl Allgrove Elementary, Heggerty phonics is the program used to help students learn phonemes. Recently, Mrs. Erin Dugan had her students demonstrate their new knowledge. Since the beginning of the year, they have advanced to three syllable words. Mrs. Dugan would say each word individually: octopus, evidence, fantastic, instrument. Each time, students would hold their hands together and make a chopping motion in the air for each syllable: ev-i-dence and fan-tas-tic. At the conclusion of the word,

students would sweep their hands across, parallel to the floor and pronounce the word in its entirety. The class is full of enthusiasm and loves the movement and choral recitation of sounds.

Connecticut's Focus on Reading

In the summer of 2021, the CT Legislature joined others in passing a bill requiring districts' reading instruction be based on the science of reading, starting in 2023. Since that time, the announcement of the six programs meeting the criteria was delayed, so many schools can not start right away. East Granby is in the beginning stages of evaluation of each program to see which will meet our students' needs, is fiscally feasible, and will help our students move forward with reading.

East Granby has used <u>Wilson Reading</u> for years as part of our tiered intervention program, where students learn decoding and encoding skills. We began implementing principles of the science of reading in the fall of 2018, with the addition of a Teachers College Phonics Program. Since that time, we have implemented the <u>Heggerty Program</u> across C. Allgrove Elementary, which teaches students phonemic awareness, as well as <u>Really Great Reading</u> phonics at R.D. Seymour Elementary.

Next, let's travel to RD Seymour and visit Mrs. Iwaniki's 3rd grade readers. This summer, the district began implementing Really Great Reading (RGR) phonics, a scientifically-based program and loved how it helped our readers so much, we continued its use. With RGR, students look at open and closed syllables, as well as learn more complex terms such as digraph (when two letters make one sound, such as TH, CH, and NG). When Mrs. I announced it was time for their Syllaboards, exclamations of "YES!" punctuated the classroom, as the students went to work with a partner on identifying syllables and digraphs. Across the elementary schools, students are becoming better readers through the science of reading, thanks to our dedicated teachers in each building!
