Emergency Assistance Fund: The East Granby Emergency Assistance Fund is available to those income eligible residents who are in need of emergency financial assistance with fuel, housing, medical, electric, and other critical needs. The fund is supported solely through donations and gifts from the community and 100% of the funds raised are given back to qualifying residents who are facing financial hardship. Donations can be made to the "East Granby Emergency Assistance Fund" and mailed to East Granby Social Services, 9 Center Street, East Granby, CT 06026.

Energy Assistance: Applications are being taken until May 31st at Social Services and now online at https://portal.ct.gov/heatinghelp/applyonline. This program is designed to help offset the winter heating costs of Connecticut's lower income households. Winter heating assistance

helps pay for a household's primary heating source such as oil, natural gas, electricity, propane, kerosene, coal, wood, and wood pellets. Economic Development Commission

East Granby's Economic Development Commission (EDC) is made up of seven members and two alternates. These resident volunteers, along with two seven-hour per week paid employees, endeavor to achieve economic development goals for East Granby. The Economic Development Commission's primary goals are consistent with the Plan of Conservation and Development (POCD) and include developing policies to support business recruitment, retention, and expansion. This is achieved by promoting, encouraging, and facilitating the development of responsible and properly planned business and industrial growth within the community, all to expand and strengthen the local economy, diversify the community's tax base, and reduce the property tax burden.

Village Center Master Plan: The EDC initiated the process for creating a Village Center Master Plan (VCMP) funded by the application and award of \$30,000 of ARPA funding plus the remainder from the Town to move the project forward. Motivated by the Plan of Conservation and Development and the Town's desire to promote economic vitality, East Granby retained Goman+York Property Advisors, LLC to assist the community with the creation of a VCMP. To best facilitate the planning process, a VCMP Steering Committee was established to provide oversight of the planning process and to provide input into the Master Plan.

The research into existing conditions started in December 2022 and continued through January 2023. An intensive week of public engagement by all stakeholders occurred between January 18th and January 24th. For those who may not have been able to attend, the public engagement process included four focus groups with Village Center business owners, Village Center business property owners. Town staff, and boards and commissions. Three resident/public focus groups were also held on January 19th, 21st, and 24th. The first two programs were planning and visioning sessions with a series of discussions and activities designed to draw insights from the public. The third session presented the findings of the first two sessions and worked with the public to further refine those results while also gathering input toward possible strategies for improvement. This third session also included a draft vision for the Village Center, now on the Town Website. (Go to EDC, "Studies.")

Participation was excellent with approximately 140 people taking part in the public programs and focus groups. During this weeklong public engagement process, an online public survey was available resulting in an additional 300 residents providing input. The final report is expected by the end of March at which time specific recommendations will be prioritized and planned for implementation.

EDC Web Page: To promote East Granby properties, our part time Economic Development Director (EDD) routinely meets with potential developers and prospective businesses to introduce them to town landowners and to help them navigate our town processes in collaboration with Town staff. In order to attract other "would be" developers or businesses, we have also bolstered our Town web pages with information for those who have not yet reached out to our ED team:

- "Studies" contains our Village Center Master Plan, Findings and Refinement document.
- "Available Properties" lists EDD contact information and links to available East Granby properties.
- "Incentives" provides a description of commercial development incentives available with links to key details and application material.
- "Demographics" will be updated to include information on East Granby demographics as provided by our VCMP consultant, as well as information available from the Bradley Development League (BDL).

News from The Democrats

Other recent resignations include Michele Holt on the Board of Education and Natalie Welsh on the Board of Finance (BOF). We extend our appreciation to all three for putting in many long hours of volunteer service for the betterment of our town.

Replacing Michele on the BOE is Lisa Griffin. Replacing Natalie on the BOF is Jeff Clark. The Republican BOS declined to accept Amanda Thompson, the endorsed replacement for Joe, despite a long tradition of filling vacancies by the endorsement of their respective parties. We believe Amanda's amazing credentials and long history of dedicated service to the town would have served us well. Several members of the town expressed their support for Amanda, and concern about the decision not to welcome her as a member of the board.

East Granby Republicans



It's budget season again, and as we mentioned in our previous *Let's Talk Turkey,* our town faces many difficult challenges such as inflation, an unexpected HVAC replacement, and middle school roof repairs

as well as prior years' underspending on Fire Department equipment replacement. These circumstances present us with a difficult discussion.

East Granby is one of the smallest towns in the state (rank in the lowest 25%), yet our property tax mill rate is one of the highest (rank in the top 30%). A look at our Grand List (taxable property) provides an explanation. The increased assessment for motor vehicles between 2020 and 2021 (more than \$17 million) was an unusual event, brought about by the pandemic. Discounting this aberration, the increase in the Grand List over the last seven years amounted to less than 1% per year (actual 0.84%). Any budget increase over this amount results in an increase in property taxes.

Modest business growth in town is the only answer to mitigate rising tax rates. For more than 20 years, the idea of a revitalized town Village Center has been discussed. Your Republican team is acting to bring this to reality. We have engaged the services of a respected consultant to assist us. Nearly 300 residents have participated in an online survey, and many dozens have showed up in person at Town Hall to voice their desires and concerns. We thank all of you who have participated. We continue to move forward with this activity.

Capitol Update Rep. Tami Zawistowski, 61st District



Nearing the midpoint of the 2023 legislative session, committees have been ironing out bills and concepts before they reach the House floor for debate. The committee process involves decision making on which proposed bills to draft, information gathering, public hearings, language revisions, and

deliberations and debate by committee members.

Public hearings are the best way for the public to make their voice heard on a wide-ranging array of legislation. Residents can submit written testimony, register to testify in person, or participate virtually on Zoom in a newly established hybrid format. This has increased public access to the legislative process, and I would encourage you to participate if there is legislation of interest to you.

Based on concerns I've heard from residents of our district, I've testified in person in several committees this session. A bill which has received considerable attention and support is one that I introduced—HB 5025: An Act Concerning Minors and Social Media Accounts. If enacted, this bill will require parental




permission for children under the age of 16 to establish social media accounts. Unfettered access to social media has contributed to juvenile mental health issues, including increased anxiety, unrealistic body image expectations, cyberbullying, and the potential for exploitation. The bill would not prohibit social media accounts under the age of 16 but would rather let parents determine whether they believe their children have the emotional maturity to participate in these venues.

A few of the other initiatives I've been involved with include a repeal of the new truck Highway Use Tax, additional tax relief measures, an omnibus mental health bill that is intended to eliminate wait lists and provide much-needed services to those with autism or intellectual disabilities, and a package of proposals strengthening public safety including greater protections for

victims of domestic violence, reducing crime by enhancing services for at-risk youth, supporting law enforcement, and reforming the bail bond system. In the Appropriations Committee, I have been carefully reviewing proposed changes to education funding to make sure that our small towns are adequately protected from a continuing push to further favor large cities in the state funding formula.

Farmington Valley Health District Releases Community Health Assessment

The Farmington Valley Health District (FVHD) is the local health department which serves the town of Granby. It has recently released a community health assessment, which uses data from more than 20 different sources to describe the health status of the Farmington Valley. The assessment examines topics such as




health behaviors, health outcomes, youth health and social determinants of health. An advisory group comprised of subject matter experts in a variety of areas helped auide the work. The health assessment will be used to develop a community health improvement plan that will outline strategies to improve health in the areas of greatest significance. The complete assessment is available at fvhd.org.

While residents of the Farmington Valley on average enjoy overall better health compared to Connecticut as a whole, the health assessment identified a number of areas for improvement. Falls among older adults, low seasonal flu vaccine uptake, high household radon levels, high proportions of overweight and obesity and poor mental health and substance use were some of the most pressing issues the assessment identified.

In addition, the report includes a wealth of information on a variety of topics, including educational attainment, income and poverty, employment, housing, transportation, and access to care.

Community members are encouraged to review the findings and offer comments and suggestions through the feedback form linked on fvhd.org. Over the next few months, the health district will be sharing the data and developing working groups in each of the priority areas. Individuals and organizations with an interest or expertise in priority areas are encouraged to participate in the working groups and can either sign up at the fvhd.org website or by calling the health district at 860-352-2333.

So You Have A Junior in the House?

Parents and guardians who have current high school juniors at home will be making decisions about what happens after graduation in the coming year. For some students and families, this is an exciting time, but for others, they might have an angst-filled summer and fall ahead of them. School Counselors and teachers at East Granby High School help prepare and educate students (and the adults who care for them), so informed decisions are made. Read on to find out what our school counselors do as our students ponder choosing between careers, the military, vocational training, and college/universities.

In the fall of their junior year, students take assessments through East Granby High School's platforms, Naviance and College Board, to look at options for careers, either right out of high school or following university. All East Granby ninth and tenth graders have school counseling lessons that further explore college and career readiness to prepare students for post-secondary planning in 11th grade with Emma Durao and Courtney Prendergast, our school counselors. Students who elect to begin working in a career following graduation have planning time with their school counselors during their junior year and throughout their senior year.

Last month, Mrs. Durao and Ms. Prendergast reviewed with me the multitude of ways they help students prepare for their post-secondary lives. All juniors have an individual post-secondary planning meeting during a study or elective, a 1:1 with their school counselor. Here, the student and counselor discuss the myriad of options available after graduation, taking into consideration a variety of factors, including student interest, long-term goals, and more. The following year, when the students become seniors, the school counselors have an additional meeting for further planning.

For instance, in early March, the school counselors met with the junior class and parents/guardians to do post-secondary planning in the evening. Over the course of the program, they present options for military, community college, and career or vocational options. Most of the evening is spent, however, discussing higher education at the university level. Other opportunities for learning about life after high school include trips to tour universities, having time to talk with various admissions representatives who visit our school, visiting training programs at a nearby community college, and talking to military recruiters on campus. This year, seniors who are research career pathways for their Capstone project have created a bulletin board. Visit the <u>EGHS School Counseling</u> site for further resources and to learn more about what is offered at East Granby High School.

One pathway students are exploring after high school are the branches of the Armed Services. Did you know students can join as a junior and not wait until graduation? There are multiple routes one can take, all which offer funding for higher education, if that is a goal. One pathway is joining one of the branches upon graduation, another is applying for The Reserve Officers' Training Corps (ROTC) scholarships for partial or full funding for university, and yet another option is signing up for the Guard. There is also the possibility of enlisting in the National Guard and doing the ROTC at the same time through the Simultaneous Membership Program. If your student is interested, please make an appointment with Staff Sergeant Alexander Drake (contact info below), who would be glad to explain these options clearly and fully.

Recently, I had the opportunity to talk with SSG Drake, of the <u>Connecticut Army National Guard</u>, when he was visiting the high school during the lunch waves. SSG Drake, a lifelong CT resident, is a 2012 Suffield HS, as well as a UCONN graduate with a degree in Biology. While at EGHS, he explained to interested students how they can earn money for college by training with the Army and Air National Guard. Both juniors and seniors can take the Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB). Applicants can take the test multiple times.

SSG Drake further shared that if a junior does the basic training in the summer before the senior year, contract time is shorter after graduation. (There is paid job training, based on the person's rank.) He shared with me that the National Guard has been more accepting of granting waivers for prior medical diagnoses and disqualifications. It is important to talk with a recruiter about the medical process to see if you qualify. His contact information: 860-982-2822 (cell) -or- alexander.r.drake3.mil@army.mil He encourages juniors and seniors alike, along with their parents or guardians to contact him to learn about the Army Guard and funding for higher education.

According to an article by the <u>Pew Research Center</u>, a highly respected, nonpartisan fact tank, only about 37.9% of Americans hold a bachelor's degree (that number includes the 14.3% who have a graduate or professional degree). More women are now earning degrees than men these days, with males reporting they are entering technical fields that do not require a four-year degree, and so are skipping over attending a university. In the article, author Katherine Schaeffer shares that approximately 10.5% of Americans had an associates degree in 2021, and those with associates or bachelor degrees (or higher) out-earned those who did not.

Any students interested in pursuing a career path after high school should start preparing their resumes and work on creating contacts in their field of interest. During the spring and summer of their junior year, positive moves include seeking internships, apprenticeships, and exploring vocational options. Most of the highest paying jobs without a degree are in the fields of healthcare, construction (electrical/plumbing), landscaping, or transportation, according to the <u>US News and World Report</u>.

If planning on going right from high school into higher education, a productive summer for a junior might include visiting potential schools and seeking an internship in a related field. Juniors should also be writing unique, polished application essays and personal statements. Remember to check out tips from <u>The College Board</u> or university websites, like <u>this one</u> for best essay results. If applicable to the student's desired major, portfolio preparation might be in order, as well.

And remember, no matter the pathway a person chooses, others still remain open, as people can change majors, get new training or certifications later, or switch jobs or universities. Often times, students in their junior and senior year become overly anxious, believing one decision is permanent - and while retraining or re-evaluating does bring its own challenges, it may also lead to more fulfillment and satisfaction down the road. Help your junior (or senior) see the multitude of options available, even beyond your own familiarity. And, if your teen does better listening to advice from anyone else other than you (wink), please know the Counseling Office at East Granby High School is here to guide them on their way!
